MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING - WED 16th May, 2012

VENUE -INDIA INTERNATIONAL CENTRE

ATTENDANCE; the forum was complete. 111 members attended the AGM.

1. WELCOME;

President Kelly Jarvis called the meeting in order. All the members were welcomed for the AGM, 2011-2012.

2. Approval of the minutes of the last AGM held on 11th May at the hotel Meridian.

The minutes of the AGM held at the Meridian on 11th May 2011 were approved by Neena Gupta and seconded by Mona Aggarwal.

3. Presentation of Reports;

◆ **AGM Report of Hospitality chairperson by Veena Hora:**

She greeted everyone by Good after noon! She said "Have you ever noticed-- our days pass slowly but years pass fast. One more WIC year is over."

Veena expressed her thanks to the members of the nominating committee for asking her to handle Hospitality. This was her first assignment as a member of the executive Committee of WIC. When friends and well-wishers heard of her selection, each one said, "oh! Lot of work, hospitality, not so pleasant a job"

However, nothing discouraged her as she was a born optimist and have a very positive attitude, as positive as this baby mosquito, who when returned from its first flight was asked by the parents "how was the flight?" and the baby mosquito replied, "Wonderful, you know everyone was clapping for me."

She said "Friends it was a great learning experience for her and she was grateful to each member of the executive committee for being her friend, guide and philosopher. She thanked them for their support, for providing a very congenial environment.

She reminded of a story from the life of Abraham Lincoln. Mr. Lincoln had come back after delivering a political speech and his wife asked him "How was his speech." Mr. Lincoln said "Which speech?" "The speech that you had gone to deliver" she said. He replied, "Actually there were 3 speeches. One was that speech that I had thought in the beginning that I would deliver, then there was the second which I actually delivered and the 3rd speech was that, which I was thinking while coming back, that I should have delivered."

Well, with no confusion in her mind. She shared exactly whatever she experienced this year.

On an average, she received about 60 to 70 RSVP cards and about 20 to 30 emails and SMS every month. Average attendance at the General Meetings was about 109 and at the circle meetings about 20 to 25.

Every year we maintain this record, and we continue to have some problem regarding hospitality and I have been getting the feedback that nothing could be done about it. However, friends, we have to recognize that so much of human effort, time, and energy is involved in organizing WIC programs. She knew that whatever she was going to say was nothing new but sometimes us all need reminders. Therefore, even if it were at the cost of repetition, she would like to share her observations with all.

She played a guessing game. (SHOWS THE RSVP CARD)

She asked 'How many of you have seen something like this before?

In addition 'How many of you have actually made use of it/posted it? Almost everyone said yes; that is --100 %

She said knew the answer .It was the postal service that has been up to some mischief, because she has to receive only 30 to 40 % RSVP cards.

Not all members send their response. Please make proper use of the RSVP cards, now we have the facility of SMS and emailing. She even took Phone calls but she suggested if possible, to avoid the phone calls.

Now about the perpetual problem – 'ATTENDANCE AT THE CIRCLE MEETINGS '

----- It is about members who do not show up

----- Or with regard to members who arrive without intimation.

----It is unfair for any hostess either to be overburdened or to find many empty places when she has taken pains to provide warm hospitality. Some circle meetings had very poor attendance. 30 to 40 % members do not turn up after confirming.

It is quite possible, that even after signing we are not able to attend a meeting in that case we can always send our regret as soon as we get to know that.

There are times when we have not signed in and we decide to attend a meeting please check with the chairperson hospitality and the hostess whether there is space for you.

Most unpleasant job that she had to do was to tell members not to attend a meeting that was oversubscribed. The irony is that we refuse members who are keen to attend and those who get a chance to attend do not show up.

Another dilemma that she faced was, who should be refused, She had been receiving suggestions like adopting 'first come first serve' policy, but in that case the 'Quick ones will always get the chance so she suggest that for such programs that are usually oversubscribed, like Gourmessa, we could put a limit as to how many such meetings a member was allowed to attend so that more and more members get a chance. She was sure, that with a little effort on our part this whole process will improve. The whole idea is that we all should-- ENJOY WIC

She thanked all the members who offered warm and generous hospitality at their homes for the General meetings and the circle meetings.

She also thanked the members who had very generously contributed snacks for the General Meeting in the month of March. All the names were printed in the May Newsletter.

She enjoyed her role as chairperson hospitality, not the work part so much but she made many new friends this year.

She wished best to her successor Marie Jenefsky Titus . She wished well to the members of the new committee, which is a mix of some very young and new members and some very senior members, and she believed mixing of different drinks can be dangerous but mixing of old and new wisdom is awesome.

Once again, she thanked her committee members for all their love and affection- she added she was going to cherish these memories for long.

◆ Report of Newsletter Chairperson - Kiran Jhangiani

She tried to do her best and gave a new face to the newsletter.

She thanked Brenda Beck for being the mastermind behind the new look, every month.

-She tried to get the newsletter out in a timely way, to all members. Firstly, by giving out, at all the General meetings. Then for those who did not attend, she first tried courier service. Had feedback, that approx 20-25 were did not receive them. Then she tried speed post. Again, approx. same number complained of non-receipt. As a result, she used good old Indian postal services and the number of non-receipt, remained the same.

-suggestions made to the new Committee, were to send out by email, which we did too, some months. Also, to have a Sub Committee, of approx 3 members for the newsletter.

She thanked the Committee for all their help and support, and the members for their understanding!

◆ Report of Treasurer by Veena Dass

Veena informed that though she was not elected to the post of Treasurer, she was asked to take over due to Serita Kakar's illness. She had the total support of the Executive Committee and had all, tried to keep our expenses as low as possible.

This year, we had no problems with the Bank ----- perhaps because of our President, Kelly's, persuasive manner.

The Balance Sheets, etc. were couriered well in time.

This year, we had 159 members who paid Rs.2,500/- each which totaled to Rs.3,97,500/-. Six members paid Rs.2,000/- before the raise in fees, i.e. a total of Rs.12,000/-. Guest fees totaled Rs.5, 000/-.

The membership directory was printed at a very reasonable cost of Rs.31, 185/-.

And now, the Gala Night : This was the very first time in the history of the Club that all the members along with their spouses or a guest were invited by the Club for the Gala Night, i.e. there was no charge whatsoever. There was good music, good snacks and food and, of course, the drinks – all on the house.

We are handing over at the end of the financial year:

Cash in Hand – Rs.27, 496/-

Cash in Savings Bank A/c – Rs.2, 04,458.92

Cash in Fixed Deposit A/c – Rs.2, 23,176.51

Now for a few suggestions:

1. The members should pay their subscriptions on time so that the Committee can put it in the bank and thus earn some extra interest.
2. This year, as you can see from the Balance Sheet, we have had to account for two Gala Nights. Therefore, our suggestion is that the Executive Committee should try to have the Gala Night – which is the major expense – in the first half of March, so that all the expenses of the Gala Night are booked in their own financial year.
3. The Club Year should coincide with the Financial Year – our Chartered Accountants very vehemently suggested this. We could have the AGM in the third or fourth week of April. The two Treasurers could jointly oversee the expenses for April. The Club could close in May and restart activities in the second half of August – this was the original concept.

This way, the new Committee is not burdened with the previous Committee's expenses for a month and a half.

Here she closed and thanked Committee for all their help and support. She wished her successor, Atsuko, and the New Executive Committee all the best for the coming year.

◆ **Report of Secretary Rosie Sahni**

She thanked all for supporting her through out the year. It was a great learning experience .This enabled her to discover her new capabilities. She requested members to come forward, be a part of the executive team for an amazing experience, and in the process make new friends. She also wished the new committee all the best.

◆ **Report of the Membership Chairperson Shawn Rauncres**

Shawn explained

1. Membership Data:
 - a. End of April 2012 – total members was 164

- b. In May 2012, taking into account resignations there are now 156 Total Current Members
 - 95 Indian Members
 - 61 Foreign Members (of which 15 are permanent foreign members)
- c. 32 Applications received this year
 - 16 Accepted (2 Indian/14 Foreign)
 - 7 Rejected (Indian)
 - 9 Pending (applications arrived after April 12)
2. 35 Countries Represented with current membership
3. AGM Attendance: Average was 109 Members
4. Recommendations from the 2011-12 Committee to the 2012-13 Committee
 - a. Create a set of membership guidelines which are used to guide the Committee when considering the merits of each application (see ours attached)
 - b. Reconsider the use and distributions of badges
 - c. Consider the fact that the foreign permanent member category is over-subscribed but that there are many NRI's who are keen to join the Club and who may be excellent members
 - d. Re-do the directory as the quality this year was very poor – find a new printer

Guidelines for the Membership Sub-Committee 2011-12

For the Acceptance of Members

The Membership Sub-Committee 2011 has created the following guidelines. These guidelines have been created by and will be followed by the members of the Membership Sub-Committee 2011 in the selection of the members for the Women's International Club, Delhi.

Guidelines should be reviewed and shared with the general membership each year at the Annual General Meeting in order to let the membership body know how the sub-committee was governed throughout the year. Guidelines do not form part of the Constitution and changes may be made without vote by the general membership.

1. The Membership Sub-Committee will adhere to the Constitution and By-Laws with reference to eligibility, ration and application process:

Constitution

Article III Membership

Section 1 – Eligibility: Any woman resident in Delhi or its immediate periphery who is interested in the objectives of the Club and is willing to contribute her time and effort to its activities shall be eligible for membership. An applicant must be under 60 years of age when she is accepted as a member.

Section 2 – Ratio: The membership ratio shall be 50% Indian and 50% International.

Section 3 – Application: An applicant for membership shall:

- (a) Attend one General Meeting of the Club as a guest of a member*
- (b) Fill out an application form which shall be signed by one member of the Club who has personal knowledge of the applicant and is a member of at least one year's standing*
- (c) Deliver the application for to the Membership Chairperson*

By-Laws

Article III Membership

Section 2 – Ratio

- (a) *Nationality shall be decided according to the applicant's passport*
- (b) Not more than 10% of the total International membership shall be reserved for foreign members permanently resident in India

Section 3 – Application

- (a) *No more than two family members of a member shall be accepted as applicants to the Club*

Section 4 – Role of the Executive Committee (and the Membership Sub-Committee)

- (a) *Ensure a balanced representation with regard to nationality, profession, special interests and age*
- (b) *Ensure that applications are considered primarily on merit, ensure that no more than two family members of a member are accepted as members of the Club*

2. When considering an application for membership, the Sub-Committee will take into account nationality as defined by the passports the applicant holds. However, the sub-committee may request whether the applicant has PIO status as partial indicator of the likelihood of the applicant staying permanently in Delhi. The constitution allows for 10% of the membership (i.e. 20 people) to be accepted as foreign members permanently resident in Delhi. Each applicant brought to the attention of the sub-committee will be considered on their own merits (i.e. what they can contribute to the Club) and if accepted the sub-committee will decide under which category to accept them.

3. Applications that have been denied by previous Sub-Committees will not be revisited by the current committee. Further, it is recommended that future Sub-Committees refrain from reconsidering unsuccessful applications for a period of 2 years.

4. **Family members** will be defined as mother, sister, brother's wife, daughter, mother-in-law, sister-in-law (husband's sister), and daughter-in-law.

5. The Sub-Committee will examine the **support and verification offered by the proposer** of the applicant.

6. The Sub-Committee will examine the **agreement of the applicant to participate** in organizational and/or performance activities when called upon by the Club committees and/or voluntarily.

7. The Sub-Committee will consider an application for membership only once the applicant has been formally introduced to members of the Sub-Committee and attended a General Meeting.

9. Issues Raised and discussed:

1. Treasurer suggested closing club year in May and restarting in 3rd week of August. She also stated that last committee's deficit was substantial in that month and a half –i.e. in April and half of May.
2. Subscription should be collected at the AGM itself so that the interest was earned. Mona Aggarwal endorsed this.
