Dear WIC,

To enrich our understanding of the Silk Road, Dr. Shebnem Akcapar, our hostess has taken a wonderful initiative of writing to the Spouses of the Ambassadors of China, Kazakhstan, Iran, Afghanistan, Uzbekistan, Turkmenistan, Kyrgyz Republic, Iraq, North Africa, other Mediterranean countries to participate in our 'Silk Road' Programme by creating a delectable 'Silk Route through Cuisine'!

Ambassador BURAK AKCAPAR who will introduce the 'Silk Road'. HE presented his credentials as the Republic of Turkey's Ambassador in August 2011. The Ambassador is also accredited to Nepal, Sri Lanka and the Maldives. Before his arrival in India, he worked as the Deputy Director General for Political Affairs focusing on South Asia at the Turkish Ministry of Foreign Affairs. His portfolio included Iran, Afghanistan, Pakistan, India, Bangladesh, Nepal, Bhutan, Sri Lanka and the Maldives. He was also the Turkish member of the International Contact Group on Afghanistan and the Co-chairman of that body's Working Group on Regional Cooperation. He took active part in the design and negotiation of the Istanbul Process on Afghanistan and concurrently the 2010 Turkey-Brazil-Iran agreement on Iran's nuclear program. Amb. Akcapar has served in different countries as a career diplomat -the US, Belgium, Germany and Qatar. He is a scholar as well. He has published two international books and many articles. He is currently writing another book on Dr. M.A. Ansari's medical mission to Turkey between 1912-13, and the past relationship between Turkey and India before Partition.

Our hostess, Dr. Sebnem Akcapar (Spouse of the Turkish Ambassador) Prof. Dr. Sebnem Akcapar, graduated from Bosphorus University, Istanbul. She has two master's degrees and holds a PhD on Social and Cultural Anthropology. After working in prominent universities in Turkey, she worked at the School of Foreign Service, Georgetown University for 6 years. Before arriving in India, she was the Director of a programme at Georgetown University called 'The Center for Eastern Mediterranean Studies'. Currently, she is currently a Visiting Professor at Jamia Milia Islamic University and JNU in New Delhi. She also is the President of Spouses of Heads of Mission Group in New Delhi. She enjoys travelling, reading and writing.

Dr. Pushpesh Pant, our Principal Speaker for the 'Silk Route' has been ex-Dean of the School of International Studies, Jawaharlal Nehru University at JNU. He has a Masters Degree in History and a Law Degree LLB. He was a child prodigy — he completed his Masters Degree at seventeen and a half!! He has an independent producer of several Documentaries and radio programmes; he has also been visiting Professor at various prestigious institutions. Dr. Pant has written many books, notable among them are, 'Ganga The Descent of the Celestial River (Frank Brothers, New Delhi)', 'Garhwal Himalaya The Ramparts of Heaven (Lustre Press, New Delhi), Himalaya, Souvenir Book Co. Hong Kong', 'Sikkim (Brajbasi Delhi)', 'Madhya Pradesh the Heart of India (Frank Educational Aids), 'Ajanta and Ellora (Roli Books New Delhi). He has also written several cook books such as 'India Cookbook' (Phaidon Press London) — 1000 Recipes'. His latest book on cuisine is 'Gourmet Journeys in India'.

World Heritage Sites in India with Amitabh Kant

In 1972 the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organisation (UNESCO) launched a programme for the identification, protection and preservation of cultural and natural Heritage Sites across the world. The cultural sites include monuments with historical, aesthetic, archaeological, scientific, ethnological or anthropological value. A site was deemed of national heritage by virtue of its 'outstanding universal value'.

In India, so far there are 27 sites of which five are "natural" sites. These monuments have been selected by UNESCO to encourage protection and preservation of cultural sites considered to be of part of World Heritage and not merely of importance to Indians. These include: Qutb Minar, Agra Fort, Fatehpur Sikri, Khajuraho, Ellora Caves, Churches of Goa, Pattadakal, Mamallapuram, Humayun's Tomb, TajMahal, Sanchi Stupas, Ajanta Caves, Elephanta, Hampi, Brihadisvara Temple, Sun Temple, Konarak and the Darjeeling Himalayan Railway.

We are fortunate to have Mr. Amitabh Kant, an outstanding bureaucrat, to speak to us on World Heritage Sites in India. He is presently the CEO & MD of the Delhi Mumbai Industrial Corridor Project. This is India's most ambitious infrastructure project, aiming to develop new industrial cities. Mr. Kant has been the key driver of the God's Own Country and the Incredible India campaigns, which promoted and marketed Kerala and India as major tourism destinations.

MAPPING INDIA by Manosi Lahiri

Manosi Lahiri will speak about her book Mapping India, a story of the subcontinent recounted through five centuries of maps. The first modern maps of India were drafted five hundred years ago, when explorers and merchants came overland from the West and carried back tales about Hindustan. In 1498, when the sea route to India opened, Europeans came in large numbers to trade, and marine charts of the routes along the ocean coasts were made. As Europeans conquered and settled, new territories further inland were mapped. Manosi is a professional geographer, educated at the Universities of Calcutta, Delhi and London. She is the Managing Director of ML Infomap, a Geographic Information company.

Benaras is older than history, older than tradition, older even than legend, and looks twice as old as all of them put together —MARK TWAIN.

Call it by any of these names. Kashi, this CITY OF LIGHT is undoubtedly the most sacred city of Hindu India; it is the core, the very heart of spiritual India. Kashi means 'light' which in this case connotes wisdom, spirituality, and enlightenment. It is one of the oldest cities in the world and is comparable to Jerusalem, Athens and Peking. A great deal of scholarly research has been done on it. The majesty of the River Ganges, the 350 temples in the city, its beautiful sunrise, the evening 'arti' with oil lamps, the chanting of the mantras do give it an exalted position. Yet all these on their own do not attribute to its unmatched greatness—a greatness which has survived centuries. It survived because its centrality rests not on its pilgrims nor on its temples or deities but because of its primordial nature which predates even the gods themselves. Religion in India is a way of life, it does not mean just visits to the temple, prayers and fasts but includes the whole social gamut of customs, theatre, music, the arts and traditional values of everyday life..

The spiritual ambience of this city which is 25% Muslim, is all the more amazing when we consider that the 11th-13th centuries brought invasions of Turks and the Muslims who wrought havoc and destruction. Mosques were constructed on Hindu temple sites to prevent reconstruction. They used bricks taken from the razed Hindu sites and often temples and mosques were built back to front. Yet Benaras showed a resilience, and even today many local Benarsis, both Hindus and Muslims consider it as their 'watan', homeland. Local Benarsis are those who have been there for at least 3 generations. The Benarsis are a fun-loving, carefree betel-chewing lot, content with a simple life. The men are rakish, in a harmless way. Benaras is known for its wrestling, brass, silk brocades, the famous betel leaf- the Banarsi paan, classical music and a dialect of its own. Oh, and there are the thugs, the petty thieves! The Benarsi courtesan is known for her beauty, charm and beguiling ways.

Though the Hindu Trinity of Brahma, Vishnu, Shiva and the great Goddess are fully represented, in reality the city belongs to Shiva and Vishnu. Annapurna is the famous manifestation of the Goddess. To a tourist, Banaras may seem a haphazard maze, but a proper study shows an organized pattern of temple construction. All major temples within India are represented here, and on the other hand Benaras reciprocal connections with all major temples all over the country.

On our agenda we propose the following for VARANASI:

- 1. Famous Sunrise of Banaras and where Buddha got enlightment (SARNATH).
- 2. Dawn Boat ride on the Ganges.
- 3. The evening Aarti of the oil lamps.
- 4. Visit to the famous temples.
- 5. Walk along the Bathing Ghats (banks).
- 6. Shopping for brocades and brass-ware.
- 7. A walk down the alleys.
- 8. World famous Benaras Hindu University and its Museum.
- Visit to the residence of Annie Besant (Theosophical Society).
- 10. Visit an NGO, 'Satyagyan', an affiliate of World Literacy of Canada's Centres, in 'GangaMahal' on Assi Ghat and in Tulsi Kunj.
- 11. Indian Classical Music Concert.
- 12. SARNATH, where the Buddha got enlightenment.

Over the years, some ex-members expressed a regret that while in India they did not learn more about Indian spirituality, traditions etc. Those of you who are here, do take this opportunity to visit this city, so sacred and unique. Reactions are bound to differ. Some will only see the thickly populated city, the dirt and squalor and miss the surrounding subtle waves of transcending calm. Come with an open mind, sit quietly on the Ganges, listen to the rhythm, the hum of the universe and imagine that there is only you, the River and your Makerand no one else. Benaras is an enigma; often a mere single visit can result in a special bonding between this city and an unwary tourist!
