#### THE SEASONAL FESTIVAL OF NORTH INDIA

Lohri is a seasonal festival of northern India celebrated especially in the states of Punjab and Haryana. It falls on a fixed date, the thirteenth of January according to the solar calendar. Lohri is a festival celebrated by the whole community with much fun and feasting.

Lohri is usually celebrated in the evenings. A huge bonfire is built and lit, and people dressed in gay clothes dance around the bonfire. The men do their foot-tapping Bhangra dance to the beat of the dholak and women perform the more gentle Gidda dance. Bonfires also have a practical use of warding off the cold air, which is prevalent at that time of the year. People are offered rewri and other sweets along with peanuts, popcorn and puffed rice. The first Lohri of a newborn baby or new bride is celebrated with much more gaiety and fanfare. Everybody is invited to join the party and the dancing goes on till the wee hours of the morning. Sweets are also exchanged between people and in the bonfire, sugarcane stalks, parched rice and sesame seeds are thrown. Lohri is a fun filled festival of the fun-loving people of India.

Please join us in celebrating Lohri the authentic Punjabi way, with great joy and in a spirit of thanks giving.


# JANUARY CALENDAR

This month Bina writes:

Sorry folks, but no calendar dates are ready for January. However, here is some interesting information:

The Gregorian Calendar The Julian year of 365.25 days was longer than the true year of 365.2422 and led to discrepancies noticed in the observation of Easter. By 1582 the error accumulated to 10 days so Pope Gregory XIII revised the calendar and declared Friday 5th October to be Friday 15th October and maintained that if future centurial years that were not divisible by 400 were not to be treated as leap years, hence century years 1700,1800,1900,2100 though divisible by 4 were not leap years. Over a period of 400 years the leap years were only 97 and not 100. In Great Britain in 1752 Thursday 3rd September of the Julian calendar was designated as Thursday 14th September of the Gregorian Calendar and the beginning of the year was changed from the 25th March to 1st January. Some countries adopted the Gregorian calendar only in the 20th/21st centuries.
