Panchayati Raj:

More Powers for Women in Self Government Monday, 9th March, 3.00 pm

The philosophy of Panchayat Raj is deeply steeped in the tradition and culture of rural India and is by no means a new concept. However, it did not have a constitutional status. The Constitution (Seventy-third Amendment) Act, 1992 provides a framework on which to build the third level of governance - panchayats - thereby seeking to transform Mahatma Gandhi's dream of Gram Swaraj into a reality. Panchayati Raj aims at a system of self-governance at the village level,

Women, with one third representation, have a substantial presence at the village and district level now. Unfortunately, the patriarchal mindset has still to be challenged in several areas. Husbands and fathers who have been decision makers often try to take away the power from elected women members, thus making them leaders in name only. This is being challenged and the process for change has begun.

Our speaker, Dr Anju Dubey, Head of the Gender Training Institute of the Council for Social Research, will tell us more about it.

TRIP TO MOUNT ABU AND UDAIPUR

At long last we were on a Club trip to Udaipur. 16 of us, casting our worries aside and giggling like school girls with anticipation! Our journey started with a train trip to Mt. Abu. We arrived early in the morning and proceeded to Palanpur palace hotel, very luxurious and set in beautiful surroundings. After a short rest, we started our sight seeing by visiting Dilwara temple. This most beautiful temple, situated a little away from Mt Abu, is the epitome of the most intricate and exquisite carving in white marble. The most skilled craftsmen plied their chisels over a period of fourteen years. Not an inch of space has been left in carving the 1444 pillars, the ceilings, the arches and the doorways with their 'dwarpals' testifying to their skill and devotion. It was thronged with devotees.

There were other ancient temples and holy places also to be visited including one with 1000 steps, where the 'not so energetic' pilgrims are carried in a hammock-like contraption by 2 coolies. We even paid a short visit to the Temple and garden of Brahmakumaris for which Mt. Abu has become famous.

That night we were invited by the Rani of Bikaner to her beautiful palace which has very tastefully been converted into a hotel. Decked in our finery, we had a lovely meal sitting on a terrace overlooking the valley with diyas lit all around us in our honour. The next night we invited them to our Palanpur hotel, where we reciprocated their hospitality in an equally tasteful manner, with dinner served in the hotel's lovely garden.

From Mt Abu we headed for Udaipur. It was a long and picturesque journey. En route we stopped at Ranakpur temples, which are also Jain temples, but much bigger and as intricately carved in marble as Dilwara. After an extensive tour of these exquisite temples, which can be called poetry in marble, we proceeded to Kumbalgarh fort. Another long climb by foot and we were rewarded by the most amazing views of the surrounding areas. The fort itself is well worth a visit and beautifully maintained as a museum. We reached Udaipur tired and happy, and looking forward to a rest. Some of our young enterprising members even took in a movie that night!!

The highlight of our tour next day was the city palace which has been the home of the Mewar dynasty for over three hundred years. The palace is a huge complex with numerous steps, rooms, levels and passages. The history of the Mewar dynasty and all the vicissitudes it faced was soulfully recorded in an excellent 'son et luminere' show in the city palace gardens.

Next day most of us left early for Nathdwara temple. It is here that an icon of Lord Krishna was brought from Mathura to save it from the iconoclastic forays of Aurangzeb. Thousands of devotees come to pay their homage at this shrine. It is also home to a group of 'Pichhwa' painters who make temple hangings with stone colours as a backdrop for the main image of Shri Nathjee.

Not far from there was the 'Eklanji' temple, where the deity is the one venerated by the rulers of Mewar. It is a smaller temple but beautifully built with the skill and devotion of the craftsmen. A few of us who had been to Nathdwara went to Deogarh to see the lovely palace, converted into a charming hotel and had lunch with the Raja.

In the evening we polished our jewels, put on our best sarees, and returned to the city palace for a formal cocktail session with the Rana of Udaipur. We sat on the terrace of his residence overlooking the magical lake. It was truly an enchanting sight with the palace shimmering in the lake.

Our last day. Some hectic shopping, antiques to be found and bargains to be made. Lunch at a resturaunt at Jagmandir which is an old monument on an island in the lake. Charming ambiance and lovely view. We even took a boat ride on the lake to reach there. And onto the station to board our train for home. Six days were not enough, but very enjoyable and fulfilling. And surprisingly, we all were still on good terms!!
