

Our Annual General Meeting will follow the usual format which is to focus on the business of the club, including reports by members of the out going committee.

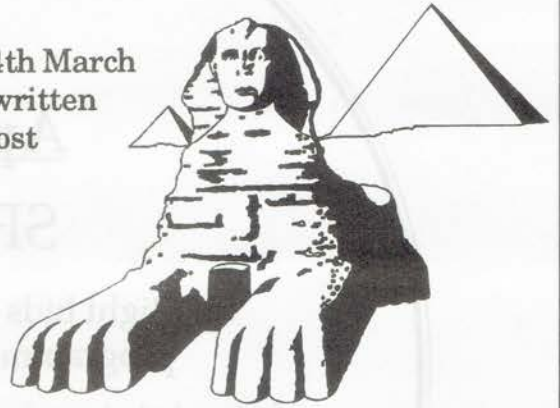

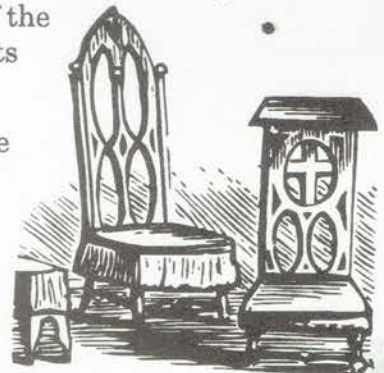

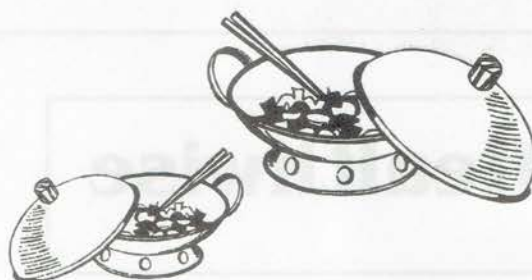

**GUIDELINES FOR THE REVIEW OF
TEN-YEAR MEMBER RE-APPLICATIONS.
AS PREPARED BY THE SUB-COMMITTEE ON MEMBERSHIP
AND APPROVED
BY THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.**

(These guidelines have been formulated by the Sub-Committee on Membership based on suggestions given by members of the Club, and a careful study of the Club's rules. The Executive Committee in a meeting held last 6 April 2000 then approved these guidelines. A most important consideration however the results of the EGM held last year, may I just reiterate the consensus taken by the body as follows;

1) Ten-year membership to be strictly enforced, 2) All to retire at the end of ten years. 3) Voted in : Members whose 10 years have expired can re-apply. 4) They go to the bottom of the list. 5) They must retire in the month they joined. 6) Criteria for re-entry to be established and 7) Finally, the waiting period of three years was voted out.)

1. Shall have served as either: a) a member of the Executive committee, b) a Circle leader or any other, c) Ad-hoc committee member at least three (3) times over a period of ten (10) years.
2. Shall have either a) contributed her talents in organising a program for the club b) offered hospitality for a club meeting or c) offered catering for a club meeting at least three (3) times over a period of ten (10) years.
3. Shall have attended the appropriate number of general meeting and circle meetings as per the Constitution, Article III section 6.
4. Has shown strong commitment to enhancing the culture of the club.

Welcome Clubs International Update

During this year the Welcome Clubs International activity seems to have diminished a bit! They are still having their bi-annual conference in Turkey in June and many of the member clubs send us their membership lists and activity programs.

Although the WCI Executive Committee had discussed putting the newsletter Worldwide Link on email, so far there has been no news of their doing so.
