ussehra is the culmination of the 10 day war that Lord Rama waged against King Ravana of Lanka, to regain his kidnapped wife Sita. It is seen as a battle against the forces of evil, and Rama triumphing against seemingly overwhelming odds, with only a force of monkeys and bears whose greatest weapon was belief in their cause.

The nine days prior to Vijay Dashmi (or Dussehra) the tenth day of Victory, are marked by fasting or at least avoiding cereals, many religious reasons are given, to lend sanctity to the cardinal principle of Ayurveda - to rest the digestive system at the change of seasons, and in preparation for the feasting to follow at Diwali.

### DIWALI

iwali or Deepavali (literary the cluster of lights) is indeed a festival of lights and one of the most joyful and popular festivals of India. The origin of Diwali is linked to several legends. The most well known is that Lord Rama on his return from Lanka and his victory over Ravan, was crowned on this day. Hence it became a day of rejoicing, and synonymous with the triumph of good over evil, light over darkness.

Sweets, gifts, crackers and lights are an integral part of Diwali. In the North, Diwali begins with the worship of the Goddess Lakshmi, the harbinger of progress and plenty; pathasas (a white candy) and phuliyan (puffed rice) are offered as symbols of goodwill and abundance. In the South, and in the Maharashtra, Diwali day begins with a dawn ceremonial oil bath followed by fun and feasting, the special Diwali delicacies are all prepared at home in Maharashtra and sent to friends and relatives in the same city. Certain merchant communities also renew their account books on this day.

#### GLOBAL CLIMATE CHANGE: CHALLENGES AND OPPORTUNITIES

Will Delhiites have to live with summer temperatures of 50 degrees (instead of 46 degrees this year)? Will Kerala's coastal areas be totally flooded? Dr. R.K. Pachauri, Director of Tata Energy Research Institute (TERI), New Delhi, a think-tank for policy analysis and critical global issues such as climate change and global warming, is one of the most outstanding international experts in this field. He has been actively engaged in the Rio Summit of 1992 as well as in the follow-up UN climate Conferences, and is principal adviser to the Indian Government on global environmental matters.

#### **HUMAYUN'S TOMB**

he tomb of Emperor Humayun, an enormous and impressive monument to the devotion of his widow, Hamida Begum, marks the beginning of a major development in the history of Indo-Islamic architecture. In spirit and substance, Humayun's Tomb is a marvel of Persian architecture.

Martin Howard will enlighten us on this astounding garden-tomb and will tell us about the exciting thing that the Archeological Survey of India (ASI) and the Indo-British Trust for India's 50th Year of Independence are doing - i.e. their recent endeavours and plans for the future.

#### HERITAGE

he St. James Church is a fine example of the colonial classical architecture of the early part of the 19th centrury. The building is a subtle synthesis of "classical" and "late Mughal" styles, and was built by James Skinner, an important and colourful personage of 19th century Delhi. The building of the church was commenced in the year 1823 at a cost of 10,000 pounds and was consecrated by Bishop Daniel Wilson in 1836. St. James is a centrally planned church, based on a Greek Cross Plan. The church consisted of an altar at the east end with porticoes on the three other sides. Since its consecration the life of the church has been linked closely with the fate of Delhi. The eminent British Conservationist, Sir Bernard Fielden visited the church in January 1989 and stressed the importance of conservation of the church.

to save succeeding generations from the scourge of war, which twice in our lifttime has brought untold sorrow to mankind, and to reaffirm faith in fundamental human rights, in the dignity and worth of the human person, in the equal rights of men and women and of nations large and small, to establish conditions under which justice and respect for the obligations arising from treaties and other sources of international law can be maintained, and

to promote social progress and better standards of life in larger freedom.

#### and for these ends

to practise tolerance and live together in peace with one another as good neighbours, and

to unite our strength to maintain international peace and security, and

to ensure, by the acceptance of principles and the institution of methods, that armed force shall not be used, save in the common interest, and

to employ international machinery for the promotion of the economic and social advancement of all peoples,


have resolved to combine our efforts to accomplish these aims.



#### HALLOWEEN

he Celtic festival of Samhain is probably the source of the present day Halloween celebration. The Celts lived more than 2,000 years ago in what is now Great Britain, Ireland and Northern France. Their New Year began on November 1. The festivals begin the night of October 31 to honor Samhain, the Celtic lord of death. The Druids (priests and fathers of the Celts) built huge New Year's bonfire of oak branches and asked all the people to light their hearth fire from the New Year's bonfire. Sacrifices were made in order to ask the Gods for good fortune in the coming year.

Today people celebrate Halloween with trick or treat and lighting jack o' lanterns to ward off evil spirits. Jack o' lanterns are carved out from huge pumpkins and hallowed inside. Candles are lit inside the pumpkin and these are placed in their front door.
