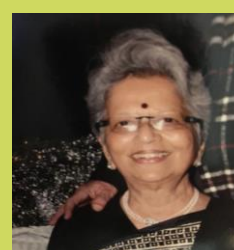

“The Beauty of Kolkata’s Durga Puja”

The world's most gigantic, non Govt sponsored outpouring - with little to do with religion but everything to do with coming together across faiths, & social strata. The Pujas are the only free entertainment the less privileged have all year.



The festival celebrates Ma Durga's victory over Mahishasura and symbolises the eternal victory of good over evil. It is also a harvest festival, paying homage to the Goddess, as the font of creation and life. During the Pujas, the Goddess is believed to descend from her husband Shiva's home on Kailasha, to visit her ancestral home.

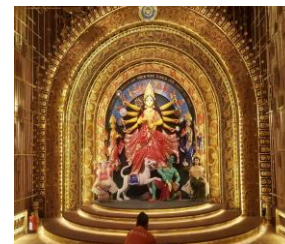
'Akaal bodhan' - the worship of the Goddess at an unusual time, tied up (perhaps) with

Ram's invocation of Durga before embarking on hostilities against Ravana.

Shaktism - the concept of Stree Shakti. Kali - the darker manifestation of Durga. Rituals: Tarpana - Mahalaya, bodhana, arati, dhakis, shondhipuja, sindur khela etc.

The significance of the different vahanas on which Durga arrives and departs.

For a display of sheer beauty, artistic innovation and breathtaking aesthetics, the Puja's are unmatched and unique. They provide a major source of livelihood for countless numbers, and the Puja's bring out the best in all - we see the police and the hordes at their disciplined best.

Cultural Kaleidoscope: 3pm, 8 October

“Hindu Deities & Sanskrit in Japan”

How many know that Hindu deities are worshipped everyday by the people of Japan? How many know that the “homa” or “havan” is performed in 1,200 temples of Japan daily, along with chanting in Sanskrit? All this and more will be seen in the talk and film presented by eminent art historian, filmmaker, and photographer Benoy K Behl.

‘Indian Deities Worshipped in Japan’ is a unique film, including scenes of the interiors and shrines of many important temples of Japan, which are not visible to the public. It was made at the request of the Ministry of External Affairs, Government of India.

Known for his tireless and prolific output of work over 44 years, Benoy K Behl has taken over 53,000 photographs of Asian monuments and art heritage, made a hundred documentaries on art history and held exhibitions in 74 countries. His films, including 26 documentaries on the paintings of India, and 26 documentaries on the sculpture of India have been nationally telecast on prime time in India, and seen at many universities and museums globally.

In January 2008, National Geographic devoted 18 pages to ancient Indian art revealed through Behl’s photography and BBC World News has carried three major stories about his pioneering work in India and Vietnam.

Behl’s book on ‘The Ajanta Caves’ is published by Thames & Hudson, London and is among the best-selling books on Indian art history in the world. His recent books include ‘The Art of India, Sculpture and Mural Painting’ in two volumes; ‘Buddhism: The Path of Compassion’ on the Buddhist heritage of the world, and ‘Hindu Deities Worshipped in Japan’.

Behl has deeply researched the wonderful cultural connections between India and Japan, for more than 20 years. The Japan Foundation created an exhibition of his photographs and text on Hindu deities worshipped in Japan, which was shown at Rashtrapati Bhavan Museum, the Japan Foundation, and the India International Centre. It was also shown in leading museums in the Indian metro cities.
