WOMEN WHO MADE A DIFFERENCE

We do hope you are thinking about who <u>YOU</u> could write about in this series. We are expecting lots of stories, because each country can boast of many women who made a difference. This month's contribution is from Gail Cornaro - thank you Gail for starting the ball rolling. I wonder how many of us realised who was behind the Nobel Peace Prize.

BERTHA VON SUTTNER

Here is a compelling story, containing elements of romance, high drama, and exemplary idealism. The Nobel Peace Prize is now a household concept: Bertha von Suttner is the woman who inspired Alfred Nobel to found this institution. Born in the Austro-Hungarian Empire in 1843, daughter of Fieldmarshall Count Franz von Kinsky, one of the most illustrious families in European aristocratic circles, she was obliged to make her own living, as her Mother had gambled away the family fortune. Although training to become a singer, she was unable to make her music her career, becoming instead governess to the family of Baron von Suttner. Here her liason with the Baron's son, who was seven years her junior, caused a minor scandal, and Bertha left to take up a position in Paris as secretary to Alfred Nobel, a contact which was to have great significance. First, however, the element of true romance: she returned to Austria and secretly married Arthur von Suttner; the couple worked a life-time closely together, her husband being one of Bertha's staunchest supporters. And a happy follow up to the true romance; there eventually followed a family reconciliation.

How did Bertha von Suttner become so influential in the cause of peace, and the first woman to receive the Peace Prize (1905)? She and her husband, after their clandestine marriage, fled to Tiflis in the

Caucasus, where they were first witnesses and then participants in events surrounding the Russo-Turkish war. Absolutely mesmerized by the plight of the soldiers, the Suttners converted their home into a hospital for the wounded, and upon returning to Austria in 1889, Bertha wrote an autobiographical novel, depicting the fate of people in war: "Surrender Arms". This book became an instant best seller all over Europe, and brought not only the authoress world fame, but galvanized heartfelt support for the concept of Pacifism in Europe and America, leading to the first Hague Peace Conference (1899), and inspiring the inventer of dynamite, Alfred Nobel, to establish an annual prize for Peace. The following 20 years of her life, Bertha spent tirelessly writing and speaking in the cause of Pacifism (also writing several novels of social criticism); her collected works encompass 12 volumes.

There is also the inescapable element of tragedy in our lives, and the life of Bertha von Suttner includes this element as well: already the Boer War revealed how far men were from attaining the goal of peace for all time, and in the fateful summer of 1914, Bertha was at work on preparations for a World Peace Conference to be held in Vienna that very August. Her own death occurred just weeks before the terrible assassination in Sarajevo that was to usher in World War I. Nevertheless, men and women will always strive to eliminate war for all time; once a year, one of them will be honoured in the highly respected Peace award. Next year, when the award is announced, remember this valiant and nobly motivated woman who was behind it.
