President's Address



Dear Members of the Women's International Club,

We are one month now into the new WIC calendar year. I do hope the activities on our calendar have made you enjoy the month of September. October is full of the bright, sparkling lights, colourful fabrics, rich

sweets and cultural soirees. But more about that later.

So much has happened over the previous month. The World has lost its longest reigning Monarch. Media across the globe has expressed sorrow over the demise of a Queen who had seen, through her royal eyes, the Sun never setting upon the British Seas to the formation of the Commonwealth, an association of free Nations. WIC also conveyed its formal Message of Condolence to the High Commission of the UK. WIC has had a very long association with the British High Commission.

We sadly witnessed India losing early, at Cricket, at the Asia Cup. Then Roger Federer, the most popular champion of Tennis, who has won 20 singles Grand Slam titles announced his retirement from Grand Slams soon after he plays the Laver Cup Team competition. His was a lifetime of great achievements. A very interesting event has been on the media, last month, wherein eight Cheetahs, three males and five females all vaccinated and fitted with satellite collars have been transported on a modified Boeing 747, from Namibia to the Kuno National Park in Madhya Pradesh, India. This translocation shall bring the Cheetah back in numbers in an otherwise dwindling cheetah population in the country.

Another event that brings us hope during these war driven times is the SCO summit in Samarkand, Uzbekistan, which is being attended by the leaders of China, Iran, Russia, Pakistan and India on regional and global issues, and is meant to discuss current events particularly related to the War scenario. Let us hope it brings lasting peace on the Planet. Back home, the Central Vista, newly inaugurated, saw thousands of visitors come to view the revamped Kartavya Path. At the same time, 3. 4 million saplings have been planted over the last two months to improve the green cover in the capital city of Delhi.

Back to WIC, now: dear ladies as you are aware that an Adhoc Committee has been set up under the provisions of Article VII of the WIC Constitution. The plan for this formation was discussed during the previous AGM. Now, the Committee, under the Chairperson, Pamela Bhagat, and constituted along with members, Peggy Sood, Renu Mehra, Stevie Clayton, Dr. Ruchika Rajan and Radhika Anand has undertaken many rounds of deliberations and carried out a few Surveys on member feedback. The Committee is expected to put up its recommendations before the Executive Committee, by mid October. Thereafter, the EC shall meet to decide on the recommendations that it finds suitable to accept. During the November GM, the EC shall present the accepted proposals before the General Body of the Club. The House can then make its decisions on the final outcome of the proposals and pass resolutions over the recommendations found fit to adopt. At the same time, the surveys circulated by the Adhoc Committee have received an encouraging response from our members.

Before I conclude, I wish you a month of joyous festivities. New clothes, newly painted home, lots of colourful lights and diyas, abundance of gifts, much mithai in the fridge and lots of prosperity as Goddess Lakshmi blesses one and all. So wish you all a very happy Diwali, a happy Vijay Dashmi, a happy Karva Chauth, a happy Dhanteras, a happy Govardhan Puja and a very happy Bhai Dooj. Actually, Halloween also follows soon after!

As I conclude, dear members, I do hope that you enjoy the results of the hard work put up by the present Executive Committee. Each member on the Board is contributing to her optimum effort in order to make it a wonderful year for the Club.

Venue: Egyptian embassy, opposite Nehru Park, New Delhi Entry through Gate № 1





Textiles Circle: Lucknow's chikankari

Wajahat Habibullah hails from an old Talukdar family of Lucknow, son of the founder Commandant of the National Defence Academy Khadakwasla where he spent his childhood. After a brief tenure as Assistant Lecturer in History in St Stephen's College Delhi ('67-68), in 1968 he joined the IAS wherein he served in J&K, the PMO in Delhi, administrator Lakshadweep and Washington DC. He served as Secretary Textiles and retired as Secretary Panchayati Raj Government of India.





He was India's first Chief Information Commissioner (2005-10) and was finally (2011-14) Chair of the National Commission for Minorities. He has served for 10 years (2004-14) as Chair of Srinagar's NIT (National Institute of Technology), and has been the Randolph Jennings Fellow at the US Institute of Peace Washington DC (2003-04). Mr. Habibullah is a noted author as well. He has written several books on Kashmir.




He will be speaking on his mother, The doyen of Lucknow Legendary Begum Hamida Habibullah. Indian an parliamentarian, educationist and social worker, and her role in reviving Lucknow's chikankari in the context of Lucknowi cultural heritage. She was also a founder Employed of Self patron Women's Association (SEWA), which promoted employment for women via Lucknow's famous chikankari work.




Deepavali, the festival of lights, is the most awaited of Indian fests. It brings to mind sweet memories: a sky full of fireworks, a mouth full of sweets, a house full of lights, a heart full of joy.

One fest, one country, but celebrated in myriad ways. In Tamilnadu, it is observed a day before "Diwali" in the North on Narakachathurdashi. Fests in the South are celebrated with a sense of punctous religiosity which is palpable whereas in the North the celebrations are boisterous. In the South, it is a day festival starting at 4 am and ending by noon. In the North, the celebrations start in the evening.





Special Circle: Defining cultural identity: At whose terms?

October 28th, 3.30 pm

In the two complementary talks, Naman Ahuja and André Correa do Lago discuss how the idea of India and Brazil were shaped in the international western imagination. The way in which these cultures were defined has had a lasting impact. We impose stereotypical ways of perceiving the world, usually identifying communities by the dominant religion followed in the area. India was typecast in the modern imagination in rather specific ways in the 19th century. A land with jungles where man met the spirit of the wild, yogis who harnessed the deepest powers of the mind, destitutes who had no more want than the veracity of their tradition, valorous aryans who were also "warm and brown", and profligate maharajas whose extravagance could outdazzle any other court of the world—the contrasts of temperament, habitat and colour, depth of spirituality and sumptuous sexuality became the standard fare of the clichés that typified India in the intellectual and artistic circles of the West at the height of colonialism.

Special Circle: Defining cultural identity: At whose terms? continued

Very differently from India, Brazil does not have texts that provide written ancient histories. Even though indigenous peoples have been present and creative for centuries in its territory, Brazil only starts to exist for the rest of the world after its 'discovery' by the Portuguese in 1500. By the second half of the 19th century the country had acquired an image that mixed exoticism, beautiful nature, gold, diamonds and the fact it was the only western monarchy outside of Europe. A society full of promises and paradoxes, with its wealth built by slaves brought from Africa and the exploitation of natural resources. The narrative of many movies and display in most major museums in the West still confirm these clichés.



The Speakers:

Naman P. Ahuja is a curator, Professor and Dean of the School of Arts & Aesthetics at Jawaharlal Nehru University, and the General Editor of Marg Publications, India's oldest publishing house dedicated to art and culture. Prof Ahuja has curated some of the most important exhibitions of Indian art in the past ten years. His scholarship covers a wide range of issues in visual culture, aesthetics, iconography and transculturalism.

André A. Correa do Lago, Brazilian ambassador to India, is a career diplomat, an economist and an architecture critic. He has curated exhibitions in Brazil and abroad. Recently, he has promoted a series of exhibitions in India to celebrate the 200 years of Independence of Brazil.
